

Pedagogy Overview: Word Study

What is word study?

Word study is the knowledge and recognition of the reliable and recurring patterns in spoken and written language. These patterns include sound-symbol correspondence, syllable types, syllable division patterns, and spelling generalizations and rules, as well as prefixes, roots, combining forms, and suffixes. Words that do not follow reliable patterns (e.g., people, above, once) can be learned and practiced through repeated exposure.

How do word study skills impact reading proficiency?

Word study skills help students develop accuracy and automaticity so they can focus their cognitive resources on deriving meaning from what they read. By practicing and memorizing recurring letter patterns, students learn to automatically recognize words containing those patterns on the first encounter. This instant word recognition, also called automaticity, leads to fluent reading.

Knowledge of word parts, such as prefixes, roots, combining forms, and suffixes, integrates word study and comprehension. When students are familiar with Latin- and Greek-derived morphemes that are often found in domain-specific vocabulary, they are better able to access information in academic texts.

Perhaps most valuable, word study skills foster the enjoyment of reading. When reading is automatic, students read more, acquire new vocabulary, expand their background and world knowledge, and further develop their comprehension skills, all of which positively impact reading proficiency.
