


Fixed vs. Growth Mindset

- Deserve responsive, scaffolded instruction that allows them to develop a sense of identity and community along with their language skills.
- Benefit from Lexia's Embedded Assessment that is consistent, responsive to their needs, and used strategically by the educators that serve them.

Pedagogy

- Culturally responsive pedagogy leverages levels of culture in curricular and instructional planning, instructional processes, classroom organization, motivational strategies, and assessment. This pedagogy engages students, promotes ownership of learning, and celebrates student achievement.
- Adopting a culturally responsive pedagogy doesn't mean making assumptions about a person's culture based on their looks, age, or socioeconomic status. Instead, it means getting to know students in a way that is personal and individualized. We will look more closely at the importance of "knowing our students" during our professional learning session(s).
- The Simple View of Reading states that reading comprehension requires both word recognition (decoding) and language comprehension. Oral language is an essential part of literacy and is needed by Emergent Bilinguals to master reading and writing and become fully literate in English.







Independent, Student-Driven Learning

Lexia English is Character-Centered

Lexia English was designed to engage with students by connecting them with characters that reflect their cultural and linguistic backgrounds. We know that Emergent Bilinguals, like all students, thrive when they find a personal emotional connection to the content that they are learning. This is the fundamental vision, and the underlying teaching philosophy behind Lexia English. The characters, like Emergent Bilinguals, have a heritage language other than English. Most of the characters have accents that reflect their native or home languages. Through these characters, Lexia English shows learners that we honor English no matter how it sounds.

Lexia English views heritage language as an asset.

Each Character Presents an Activity

When using Lexia English, students engage with characters who come from a variety of cultural and linguistic backgrounds and who possess diverse abilities and interests. Characters speak with unique accents that reflect their heritage languages. Each character exemplifies the benefits of being not only bilingual or multilingual, but also multicultural. Encounters with the Lexia English characters provide learners with opportunities for extensive speaking and listening practice that spans the curriculum, utilizing the patented speech recognition technology.

The program's corrective feedback helps each learner progress linguistically and academically at their own pace. These characters invite students to see their own bilingualism or multilingualism as an asset.




How Lexia English Works

Lexia English has 19 levels available to K-6 students. Students begin the Lexia English program by creating an avatar, a personalized representation of themselves that appears throughout the program. Next, students view an onboarding video and complete a one-time placement assessment that determines their correct entry point into the program. The placement questions are designed to assess both receptive and productive language skills (speaking, grammar and syntax, and listening comprehension). Based on their performance, students will be placed into an entry point that corresponds with their knowledge and use of English.

Students are expected to independently work through the interactive student program and engage in educator-facilitated lessons to support their active, ongoing engagement in language practice.

Each level is broken into four **Activities**, centered around the following domains: Math, Science, Social Studies, and General Knowledge/ Biographies. Students are exposed to a new character at the selection of each activity and have the autonomy to choose the activity they wish to engage in next. Each activity has three sequential **Encounters** that engage the students in various Speaking, Listening, and Grammar units. The final unit in each encounter is a **Presentation of Knowledge**. This scored unit measures the student's accuracy for the entire encounter.

One of the main features of Lexia English is its simulated conversation via our speech recognition technology. Students will actively and consistently engage in conversations and practice speech with characters in the student program. With the power of machine learning, the Speech Recognition Engine is constantly learning and being improved by user usage and with Lexia's technical enhancements.







Students can monitor their usage and level progress. They can see:

Students complete a brief microphone calibration warm-up upon logging into the Lexia English student program. A microphone meter indicates that the program hears the student's response.

If you notice that a student is frequently being prompted to recalibrate, check that their headset is plugged in properly and that the microphone is positioned correctly while the student is speaking.

Level Screen

Students choose a character they wish to engage with. They can see:

- G Current level: Lexia English has 19 levels available to K-6 students.
- (H) **Skill Badge:** When an activity is completed, a skill badge appears.
- Activity: Each level in Lexia English presents four characters. Students choose a character to enter an activity focused on a specific subject area.
- **Domain:** Each activity is centered around the academic language of Science, Social Studies, Math, and General Knowledge/Biographies.
- **Activity Progress:** A progress meter fills in as students complete units in the activity.
- Logout: Students click their name to exit the program and save their progress.

Activity Screen

The following information is visible to students:

- **Encounters:** Each activity has three sequential encounters that engage students in various speaking, listening, and grammar units.
- N Encounter Progress: A progress meter fills in as students complete units in the encounter.
- **Encounter Badge:** An icon appears as students complete each encounter.
- P **Logout:** Students click their name to exit the program and save their progress.

Unit Screen

Units provide purposeful repetition and opportunities to practice speaking and listening with immediate, corrective feedback in a safe, nonjudgmental environment. Students see:

- Microphone Button: Students click this button when they are ready to speak. The microphone meter appears when the Speech Recognition Engine (SRE) is listening to them.
- Repeat: Hear the character say the instructions or the sentence again.
- S Presentation of Knowledge: The final unit in each encounter is a scored unit that measures the student's mastery of the skills practiced throughout the encounter.
- T Logout: Exit the program and save progress.

There are two ways to monitor progress within a unit:

Unit Rounds: The green dots must all be full in order for students to receive credit for the unit. If a student does not complete all unit rounds, they will restart that unit the next time they enter the encounter.

Unit Meter: This meter indicates how many units the student has completed for this activity.



Lexia English Instructional Model

2-Step Instructional Branching

In each unit, a student practices skills throughout a series of tasks. The program provides scaffolded support and instruction on the targeted grammar skill. Students who demonstrate mastery can quickly move through units and onto more advanced proficiency levels. This 2-step instructional branching ensures individualized learning and instruction for every student.

- The Standard Step provides an independent task that allows students to display their knowledge of the targeted grammar skill. If only one error is made, or if the student answers the step correctly, they move on to the next Standard Step. If the student makes two errors, they move to the Instruction Step for the targeted skill.
- 2 The Instruction Step indicated by a chalkboard background with a yellow border, explicitly teaches the targeted grammar skill through a series of scaffolded tasks. When the student successfully completes this step, they progress to the next Standard Step.



2-Step Instructional Branching Model

Standard

The adaptive branching reacts to the performance of the student. If a learner is having difficulty with a task, they will drop to Instruction. Upon successful completion of the scaffolded task, the learner **returns to the Standard Step and continues in the program**.








Lexia English is all about facilitating conversations, so we created a report specifically to allow you to plan and prioritize small group instruction based on how students are performing in the program. This report shows:


- Student groupings: A blue dot on the number line indicates how many students are currently working in that program level. A small yellow dot indicates at least one student within that level is recommended for an teacher-led lesson.
- E Content Area and Activity Name: Review the activity names to understand what listening and grammar skills students in that level are learning (e.g. Describing with Annie using Nouns).
- Presentation of Knowledge score under 80% are recommended for an teacher-led lesson (shown in yellow). Students who perform below 50% are the highest priority for lessons (show in orange). Click on *View Lesson* to see a teacher-facilitated lesson designed to address the listening, speaking, and grammar skill for that activity.





The Parent/Guardian Report

Building a bridge between school and home is an important part of learning, particularly for Emergent Bilingual students. To help you connect with and keep your students' families informed of and involved in their child's English language development progress, share the Lexia English Parent/Guardian Report PDF.

The report provides a simple view into the student's progress through the program, with a short introduction to parents and caregivers at home and language frames from the student program to practice. This one-page report is designed to only display one level at a time. It will display the level that is selected on the screen when you click the Print menu option.




Lexia Lessons

Lexia Lessons provide targeted, teacher-facilitated opportunities to promote conversations in English. These lessons can be utilized as resources for pre-teaching and reteaching to provide targeted instructional support. As with the student program, Lexia Lessons incorporate language frames, as this scaffolding technique helps students effectively engage in conversations.

Lexia Lessons provide both speaking and listening practice and align with the skills being taught in the student program. myLexia flags students for a Lexia Lesson if they score less than 80% on any Presentation of Knowledge unit. Educators are provided with Lexia Lessons and small group pairing recommendations to support these students in a small group setting. Lexia Lessons can be found in both digital and print form in the Lexia English Resources Hub as well as in myLexia.








Lexia Skill Builders

Lexia Skill Builders for Lexia English Language Development are designed to help students further engage with content from the student program through writing tasks and speaking routines focused on oral presentation skills. Students plan and draft a presentation script using the language and grammar they have learned in Lexia English. Opportunities for oral and written expression, peer collaboration, and skill refinement are embedded in the design of the Skill Builders.

myLexia now provides support for the Lexia English Skill Builders. Classroom teachers can easily see when a student completes a program level or is recommended for a Skill Builder, and then mark the Skill Builder as delivered—all within the myLexia reporting platform.



Implementing Adaptive Blended Learning

Lexia English Implementation Models

Lexia English fits flexibly to the needs of your students and the demands of your schedule. While there are many ways to implement Lexia English, two recommended models that many find success with are the Push-in and Pull-out Models.

Push-in implementation provides English Language Development (ELD) instruction in the student's content area classroom. Push-in ELD teachers support the classroom teacher and/or the general education teacher working with the Emergent Bilingual students.

Pull-out implementation provides ELD instruction outside the mainstream classroom and for a specific block of time. In this model, an Emergent Bilingual student spends part of the day in the mainstream classroom and is "pulled out" for ELD instruction.

Lexia English Implementation Examples

While students' time in the student program is critical, the combination of this independent practice with targeted, teacher-led lessons is what defines an effective implementation of Lexia English. One of the advantages of Lexia English is that it can be implemented in a variety of instructional settings. Whether teaching takes place in a classroom, following a hybrid model, or fully remotely, Lexia English can fit into your school or district's instructional model.

Option A (assumes a 35+ minute period)

A group of students work independently on the student program, while the teacher works with the rest of the students using the teacher-led Lexia Lessons. The groups will rotate, allowing the teacher to work with all the students as needed.

Option B (assumes a <35 minute period)

Students work in the student program three days a week and engage in teacher-led lessons on alternate days. Teachers organize groups each day to ensure they work with all students as needed through the course of the week.



Preparing for Lexia English

It will be important to plan to introduce and model the Lexia English student program to your students prior to asking them to work independently. Planning for the Classroom Environment supports you in creating or making necessary adaptations to maximize the accuracy of the Lexia English Speech Recognition Engine.

We suggest the following:

- Model for students the proper way to sit at the computer and how to properly wear a headset with a microphone.
- Introduce students to the microphone button and microphone meter.
- Demonstrate and practice the calibration warmup process. Have students practice wearing the headset correctly, counting from 1-5.
- Remind students to begin speaking after clicking the microphone button and hearing the tone.
- Introduce students to the Lexia English characters who will help them navigate through the program's activities by modeling various activities for the whole class.

Important activity reminders:

- If a student logs out of Lexia English before completing a unit, the unit bookmarks are lost and the student must start at the beginning of the unit upon return.
- Presentation of Knowledge (PK) units always bookmark even if a student logs out and returns.
 PK units are the final unit of each activity and are scored.
- When students log back into the program, they automatically return to the last encounter they were working on and are encouraged to continue from where they left off.






