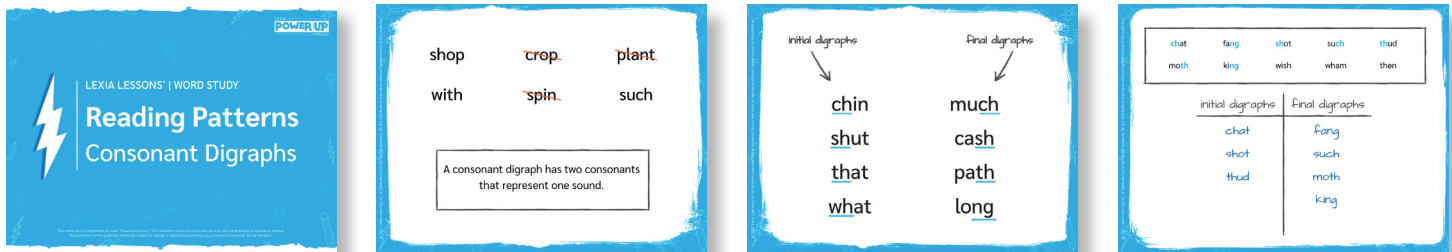


# Lexia Lessons: Slide Decks

## Overview and Usage Tips

To help you support your students and differentiate instruction in any setting, we've developed a series of Lexia Lesson slide decks using the Google Slides™ web-based presentation program.



### What are Lexia Lesson slide decks?

Lexia Lessons are explicit lesson plans to guide educators in providing targeted intervention to individual students, small groups, or the whole class. The PowerUp Lexia Lesson slide decks can be used as a complement to our printable Lessons in the classroom or in a remote learning environment. Designed for live participation, these teacher-delivered Lessons include:

- A description of the target skill and its importance to language and literacy development
- Information about why students may be struggling, common misconceptions, and working with specific student populations
- Speaker notes to support instruction and guide the presentation of material
- Interactive questions and application activities
- Engaging visual elements and presentation features
- Visually engaging Anchor Charts that can be used to reinforce skill development

Educators are integral to the delivery of each lesson—they control the dialogue and pace. This personalized approach supports the varying needs of all students.

### Where can Lexia Lesson slide decks be found?

Log in to [myLexia](#) > *Resources* to access the *Resources Hub* > *Support for Instruction* page. When you select a Lexia Lesson, you will be prompted to make your own copy of the slide deck. Your copy of the Lexia Lesson slide deck will be stored in Google Drive™ online storage service, so you can access it at any time and from any device. Because you won't be accessing this instructional resource directly through the myLexia dashboard, you'll need to manually mark Lessons as delivered in your Class Overview.

### How can Lexia Lesson slide decks be used?

The myLexia reports provide educators with actionable data, and Lexia Lessons are an important part of that action plan. The embedded practice and instruction in the online program may be sufficient for some students, but many students benefit from targeted, educator-delivered instruction. Lexia Lessons can be flexibly integrated into classroom routines based on instructional goals and student needs.


Lexia Lesson slide decks are designed to be delivered by a teacher in presentation mode—either in person or through a video conferencing platform.

## Follow these 3 simple steps to support your students with Lexia Lesson slide decks:

1. Open your copy of the Lexia Lesson slide deck stored in Google Drive. From the toolbar, select **View > Present**. Or, select the **Present** button in the top right corner.
2. While in presentation mode, view the speaker notes to access the educator script, transition directions, and lesson delivery tips. Select **Notes** from the black toolbar at the bottom of your screen or press the **s** key. *You may need to bring the speaker notes pop-up window to the front of your screen by pressing the s key twice.*
3. Project the Lesson slide deck in the classroom, or use your school's recommended video conferencing platform for remote delivery.

## Tips for Successful Lexia Lesson Delivery

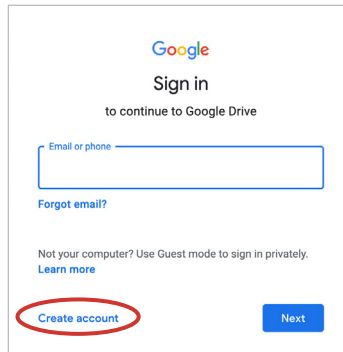
- ✓ These Lesson slide decks are designed to be delivered in a short amount of time (usually about 10 minutes!) and with a minimum of student materials. The goal is to get students back on track to reach their literacy goals.
- ✓ Schedule instructional sessions for individual students or small groups who need support with the same or similar skills. Afterward, you will need to manually mark a Lexia Lesson as delivered in myLexia.
- ✓ Always open the speaker notes when previewing or presenting the Lesson. The Notes window is not visible to students and can be resized for easier viewing. The text size is also adjustable.
- ✓ Speaker notes for each slide may include these symbols:
  - A speech bubble and **bold text** indicate a suggested educator script. (Expected student responses are written in parentheses following a prompt or question.)
  - ▶ A solid arrow indicates a transition within a slide that requires a mouse click or right arrow keystroke. Transitions are often used to highlight letters or words, or to model an example for students.
  - ✓ A checkmark indicates instructional support and teaching tips.
- ✓ Specific layouts are designed to cue students to prepare to write or type, to listen, or to speak:


- ✓ Feel free to modify the Lesson to fit learner variability. Slow down or speed up the pacing, or pause your presentation to check in with students at built-in intervals: after the Instruct section or between Practice activities.
- ✓ Each Lexia Lesson Slide Deck concludes with a reminder for students to use the Hints button when they return to the online activities. Consider sharing a printed version of the Anchor Chart with students who would benefit from additional support.

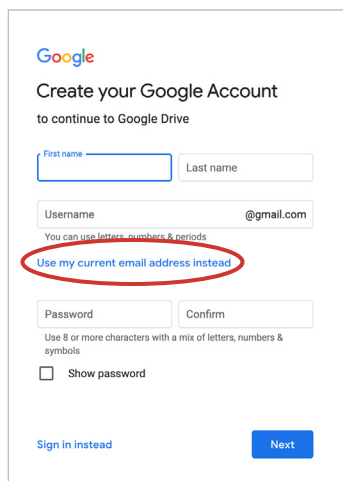
## Access and Usage Tips for Microsoft® Users

Lexia Lesson slide decks are available for schools using a variety of platforms, including Microsoft 365®. When you select a lesson slide deck, you will be prompted to make your own copy in Google Drive™ online storage service. If you do not already have a Google account, complete the following steps:

1. Select *Create account* when prompted to sign in.



2. Select *Use my current email address instead*, and enter your school email address to open the file.



3. With the digital resource open in your browser window, navigate to *File > Download > Microsoft PowerPoint*.

4. To present a Lexia Lesson, select *Slide Show* from the top menu.
